Poet, author, and literary critic Edgar Allan Poe rises for this special reading! One of the most imaginative writers of the 19th century, best known for his poems of mystery, horror and the macabre, Poe was also a prolific author of short stories, science fiction, and detective fiction. Many of his works, still familiar after more than 150 years, are now being republished as graphic novels.

Mr. Poe will be portrayed by Rob Velella, an independent literary historian and playwright specializing in American literature of the 19th century. Velella has published articles and presented academic papers on figures as varied as Margaret Fuller, Oliver Wendell Holmes, and Walt Whitman. He has lectured at various historical sites, libraries, and colleges from Pennsylvania to Maine and contributed to museum exhibits at the Boston Public Library and Harvard University's Houghton Library. In ongoing efforts to familiarize today's readers with 19th century authors, Velella's portrayals of literary figures Nathaniel Hawthorne and Edgar Allan Poe were featured on National Public Radio and in the Los Angeles Review of Books. Join us and hear Rob Velella bring to life Edgar Allan Poe while reading from Poe's works.

Healthy Eating

As a followup to our January Branch Meeting, Sally has graciously supplied a recipe to try. Enjoy!

Cornbread

Ingredients:

- 1 c. cornmeal
- 1 c. flour
- 1 Tbsp. baking powder
- 1 tsp. cinnamon (optional)
- 1 c. unsweetened soy or almond milk
- 1/4 c. unsweetened applesauce
- 1/4 c. maple syrup or agave nectar

Directions:

Preheat oven to 400°F. Set aside 9-inch square baking pan (lined with parchment paper or lightly oiled) or nonstick pan. In a bowl, whisk cornmeal, flour, baking powder, and optional cinnamon. Add soy or almond milk, applesauce, and maple syrup to combine. Pour into pan; bake 18-20 minutes, until an inserted toothpick comes out clean.
