This month we are pleased to welcome a team of guest speakers: Jamie Falo, Library Director, and Carol Siefken, Youth Services Coordinator, of the Murrysville Community Library (MCL): Gabriela Rose, the Science Coordinator of the AIU Math and Science Collaborative (MSC); and Chuck Greenberg, MCL Trustee, Board Director of the Westmoreland Library Network (WLNTM), and consulting Mentor and co-PI for the MSC.

STEM (Science, Technology, Engineering and Math) learning is seen as critical for the future. 
STEM at MCL Background

As articulated by the AIU Math and Science Collaborative and its partners, "increasingly policy makers and educators are calling for earlier beginnings and informal opportunities in STEM. As one of the oldest and only free public spaces for learning, libraries are poised to fill a role as providers of early STEM learning experiences."

Storytime STEM-pack product development and pilot Professional Development for librarians has been funded primarily by four agencies, three of which are headquartered in the Pittsburgh region: The Community Foundation of Westmoreland County (The Pittsburgh Foundation), the Eden Hall Foundation, and the PPG Foundation. However, the NSF I-CORPS™ for Learning project was instrumental to Storytime STEM-packs' present form as a library tool.

The pilot collaborators and the Collaborative for Evaluation and Assessment Capacity in the School of Education, University of Pittsburgh, "learned that the building of early childhood STEM understanding through effective professional development is an ongoing process. The challenge is to learn how to institutionalize integration of STEM programming into librarians' work, making STEM a "part of the DNA" of library staff. The further task is to learn how to better reach children AND their families."
