# January Branch Meeting Anti-Gerrymandering

"Gerrymander" (or as originally written, Gerry-mander) is a term that dates back to the early founding of our country. In 1812, a political cartoon appeared in the original Boston Gazette in reaction to then Governor Elbridge Gerry's action to redraw Massachusett's state senate election districts to benefit the Democratic-Republican Party (and against the Federalists.) The cartoon depicted a mythical salamander-like figure, and was an attempt to satirize the unusual shape of the district. The term Gerrymandering has been used extensively since then to describe district shape manipulation for partisan gain.

Dr. John Nagle, Professor Emeritus in the Physics Department at Carnegie Mellon University, has taken a special interest in Gerrymandering, especially as it relates to Pennsylvania, and has written extensively on the subject. Most recently, he published an article entitled, "What criteria should be used for redistricting reform?" The focus of this paper is on the criteria that should be used by a redistricting commission rather than on criteria for challenging an approved map in the courts. In other words, how should the map be drawn in the first place rather than how could a bad map be overturned.

Dr. Nagle will discuss the math and science of what he likes to call "Anti-Gerrymandering." At first it seemed to him that the remedy was obvious, but he has since learned it isn't. By studying the political science literature and undertaking his own investigations, including drawing and evaluating congressional maps for Pennsylvania, he realizes how complex the issues are.

Please join us for a discussion that impacts all of us as voters, and find out what the future holds for the possibility of change.
