Title IX Changes

American Association of University Women (AAUW) Chief Executive Officer (CEO) Kim Churches issued the following statement on the U.S. Department of Education final Title IX regulations for schools dealing with sexual misconduct:

The U.S. Department of Education issued a rule that will substantially weaken Title IX, rolling back important protections for student survivors of sexual harassment and assault.

The decision to move forward with this change follows more than a year of vigorous opposition from survivor advocacy organizations, civil rights groups and educational institutions. The new rule will make it harder for students who have experienced sexual harassment or violence to come forward to get the protections Title IX was created to provide.

In the best of times, the rule is ill-advised: It threatens to turn back the clock, reversing policies that were put in place to make it easier for survivors to report sexual misconduct. The rules will stack the deck against survivors, making it too onerous, even traumatic, for many to come forward.

Right to Vote Centennial Video

One hundred years ago, on August 18, 1920, the 19th Amendment to the Constitution was ratified, enfranchising all American women and declaring for the first time that they, like men, deserve the rights and responsibilities of citizenship: the right to vote.

Driving the Disenfranchised: The Automobile's Role in Women's Suffrage

In the video, Kim Cady, assistant curator of the Car and Carriage Museum at The Frick Pittsburgh, examines the role that automobiles played in furthering the cause of women's suffrage in the United States. Female drivers challenged the notion that women ought to remain sequestered in the home. The automobile became an integral part of the suffragist enterprise; serving as a stage, it became a focal point of speeches and a platform for the cause.

Great Decisions 2020

The last Friday in February, Susan Greenberg lead the discussion on "Human Trafficking" and Roberta Chunko, Social Studies teacher at Franklin Regional High School, brought four of her students to participate in the discussion.

We started March with Barb Glozik leading a discussion on "India and Pakistan".

The next week, March 13th, Joyce Vernon lead a discussion on "U.S. and the Northern Triangle" and Melissa Miller, another Social Studies teacher at Franklin Regional High School, brought three of her students.

We by then had our last two topics covered by volunteer discussion leaders. And we were looking forward to hearing Charlie Beard lead us in a discussion on "A.I. and Data". Chuck Greenberg was returning as our Discussion Leader on "The Red Sea Region" and Bethia Schulz was planning to lead us in a discussion on "The Philippines".

Unfortunately Coronavirus arrived and impacted all our plans. Franklin Regional schools closed. The Murrysville Community Library closed initially until after Easter weekend, but ultimately everything shut down for the rest of the school year.

Since our meetings are held in the Library Meeting Room, we depend

on the Library for our facilities and audio-visual aid (laptop and projector). Our AAUW Board cancelled all public Branch meetings including GREAT DECISIONS and other Special Interests Groups. We now have to wait and see what will happen in the coming months.

Barb Glozik and I want to thank all those involved in making GREAT DECISIONS possible. Judy Shoemaker, Maria Cuccaro, and all the staff at the Murrysville Community Library helped us set up and present our GD meetings. We thank you. "Thank you" to all the Discussion Leaders who volunteered for GREAT DECISIONS and who prepared to lead the discussions whether you were able to or not. Your efforts are truly appreciated. And "thank you" to all the participants who attended. GREAT DECISIONS could not happen without you. It was a great spring and could have only gotten better. Thank you!
