Reminiscing about Cheese Co-ops

During the late 1970's and into the 1980's we established a cheese co-op. The Pennsylvania Macaroni Company (PA-Mac) in the Strip district of Pittsburgh was wholesale



only. By our joining together in a co-op we were able to purchase cheese, sliced meats, dried herbs, dried pasta, good olive oil, etc. in bulk. Each member received an order form to fill out. These were added together to form a large order which we sent to PA Mac. One of our members would go to the store on the appointed day to pick up our order and deliver it to one of our homes. When the driver delivered the order we cut cheese, weighed out herbs and meats and sorted pasta, etc. to fill participants individual orders. Other members of the group prepared individual invoices for each order and collected money. We then prepared one payment to send to PA Mac. At some point PA-Mac realized there was a demand for their products in the retail market and opened up to the public. They have been a successful retail store ever since. My husband and I still shop there regularly.

WE DID IT! I am happy to report that the Murrysville Area AAUW and Murrysville Community Library (MCL) had a very successful Used Book Sale (UBS) this past May 5th, 6th, and 7th.

Last November, we had a donor book drop-off event as a fundraiser because of COVID-19 restrictions. This past February things began to open up and we began to toy with the idea of an actual book sale. In early March, four of us met with Library Director Amy to discuss a possible used book sale. Amy suggested a bi-annual UBS beginning with one the first week of May. She offered the main area of the library for the sale and recommended separating the donated books into fiction and non-fiction and selling everything "by the bag". Donations were to come in during the month of April and her staff was to cull and sort with AAUW volunteers to work the set-up day, the three days of the sale, and the take-down day. Susan Greenberg wrote articles for publication in the Penn-Franklin News and the Murrysville Star. Thank you, Susan.

Ah, "the best laid schemes o' mice an' men, ..." One week into the donation month, the library staff was overwhelmed and Amy asked for AAUW volunteers to help sort, cull and box donations in the conference room. Her staff would cart the boxes out. AAUW veteran cullers and sorters as well as rookie volunteers all came to the rescue. Thank you, Carol Gezon, Susan Petrie, Susan Greenberg, Janet Sutton, Diane Eldridge, Judy Johnson, Susan Long and Lisa Roudabush.

Betty Hollingsworth, as our volunteer enlister, set up a schedule of cullers and sorters who worked with the library staff and library volunteers to box over two hundred boxes of donated books, DVDs, CDs and puzzles. Carol Gezon brought stored boxes from Graham's basement. Susan Petrie handled all the puzzle donations. She collected them, stored them at her home, priced them and brought them back to set up for the UBS. She and Bethia Schulz took turns working in the puzzles area all three days of the Sale. Thank you. Thank you.

Ten members volunteered to put out yard signs on the first day of the UBS and retrieve them after the last day of the UBS. Thank you, Betty Hollingsworth, Carol Gezon, Susan Petrie, Susan Greenberg, Janet Sutton, Diane Kaufmann, Diane Conway, Joyce Vernon, Laura Livingston, and Donna and Charlie Beard. Several people commented during the event that a sign caught their eye and they were so glad to come to the library to buy.

Set up day came and before 1:00, Amy Riegner, Catherine Westerdorf, Laura Seiple, Anna LeDonne, and Becky Martinazzi had set up all the tables. A little after 1:00, Amy and I agreed on the designated areas for the five categories (fiction, non-fiction, children's, puzzles, and DVD/CD/Audiobooks), and then all five librarians started carrying labeled boxes of books to the appropriate tables - white tables for fiction and wooden tables, for the most part, for non-fiction. Carol Gezon arrived early and started unpacking boxes. By 3:00 fifteen AAUW volunteers had arrived and pitched in unpacking boxes onto 10 tables of fiction with 22 undertable shelves; 8 children's tables of various sizes and heights; and 8 tables of non-fiction, book sets, magazine file sets, etc. with 7 undertable shelves. The library staff set up one double table of DVDs, CDs, and audiobooks. By the end of the day we were ready to go; although ,13 boxes of non-fiction were still not unpacked and 6 boxes of children's were also under tables not unpacked. We just didn't have enough surfaces for all the books.

Thursday morning was nice and sunny. Volunteers arrived between 9:00 and 9:30 and we welcomed 16 eager patrons when the doors were open at 9:30 AM. Unpacked boxes were opened by shoppers and by the end of the day all the non-fiction boxes and the unopened children's boxes were emptied up on the tables. 12 AAUW volunteers worked either morning or afternoon shifts and some were at the UBS all day. Thank you to Betty Hollingsworth, Carol Gezon, Susan Petrie, Susan Greenberg, Janet Sutton, Patti Vargo, Diane Kaufmann, Bethia Schulz, Sue Hauser, Lisa Roudabush, Sally Haleen and Barb Glozik. It was a very good day.

Friday was a horrible day weather-wise. It rained all day, and at times, it poured quite heavily. Volunteers came and sorted many of the fiction books by authors. By the end of the day, all of the under-table shelves were gone. Tables were shifted and non-fiction books were separated vaguely into history and biographies, cookbooks, gardening and crafts, geographies, sciences, self-help and philosophy, sports, arts, and coffee-table books. 11 volunteers worked on Friday. Thank you to Carol Gezon, Betty Hollingsworth, Susan Petrie, Patti Vargo, Joyce Vernon, Bethia Schulz, Sue Hauser, Susan Long, Lisa Roudabush, Celine Kandala and Laura Livingston. Saturday began cloudy and misty. Most of the children's books were gone. Most of the fiction had been alphabetized. The non-fiction was still being sorted and displayed better. Puzzles were moved to the front to be more visible. 11 volunteers came into work. Thank you to Betty Hollingsworth, Carol Gezon, Susan Petrie, Janet Sutton, Patti Vargo, Diane Kaufmann, Joyce Vernon, Bethia Schulz, Sue Hauser, Celine Kandala and Barb Glozik.

These AAUW members were joined around 3:00 for the take-down by Susan and Chuck Greenberg, Charlie Beard, Rick Petrie and Dick Rivers. AAUW volunteers also arrived by 3:00 to load up their cars to take to Half Price Books. Thank you Susan and Rick Petrie, Susan and Chuck Greenberg, Patti Vargo, Diane Kaufmann, Joyce Vernon, Sue Hauser, Charlie Beard and Dodie Hagan. By 3:55 the Library was back to normal. All boxes of books had been loaded into cars. Boxes, yard signs, shelves, and reusable category signs were on their way to Graham's basement. Any miscellaneous empty boxes were taken to the cardboard compacter.









It has to be said that the MCL Staff and library volunteers worked throughout April (and even before) sorting, culling and toting boxes of donated books. Evan Hrobak and Laura Seiple were always willing to heft the heavy boxes and store them or take them out to our cars to take to Half Price Books. I am sorry I don't have the names of the library's adult volunteers that worked with our AAUW cullers and sorters. Their help was greatly appreciated. Evan and Elliot Chen, teen volunteers, culled and sorted during April and then showed up at 3:00 PM on Saturday, May 7th, to carry boxes of books out to our AAUW members' cars to take to HPB. Katherine Neidig was invaluable in her help throughout the time. And of course none of this could have been possible without the inspiration, recommendation, approval and help of Director Amy Riegner. Thank you all!

I want to also mention the women who helped me over and over again. I inherited a Used Book Sale Notebook, and it was recommended that I organize a committee to plan and work on the USB. I co-opted the AAUW Board Members as my committee instead. President Janet Sutton allowed me to bring up my ideas and gather suggests and plans during our monthly Board meetings. Board Members who had been former UBS Chairs generously shared their experiences and expertise and worked hard to make this used book sale a success. I reached out to other former Book Sale Chairs for their help and suggestions, and was never turned down. I am forever in their debt. Thank you, Janet Sutton. Thank you, Carol Gezon, Susan Petrie, Sally Haleen and Betty Hollingsworth. And thank you, Susan Greenberg for being my publicity person and library liaison.

\$2,897.50 was generated by the three day used book sale. HPB money is still being collected but as of May 20th, \$409.67 had been turned in. This brings the total up to \$3307.17. This was a very good start for a new way of raising funds for the Murrysville Community Library and for AAUW programming. Thanks also to everyone who donated and to everyone who came and bought books, puzzles, DVDs, CDs and audiobooks. And we are already planning our second bi-annual UBS for November 10th, 11th, and 12th. ON TO THE FUTURE!
