The Roeblings of Saxonburg: The Brooklyn Bridge and Smithfield Street Bridge Rennick Steele

Thursday, April 13, 2023 Meeting Starts 10:00 AM Member Social 11:30 AM Murrysville Community Library TechNook 4100 Sardis Road, Murrysville, PA

John A. Roebling, a university trained engineer, immigrated from Prussia to Western Pennsylvania with his brother in 1831, where together they founded Saxonburg, PA, and took up farming. In

1841, Roebling began manufacturing wire rope, an innovation he employed in the design and construction of many suspension bridges in the United States and Canada, including the Brooklyn Bridge.



Rennick Steele (Ren) will tell us the fascinating story of the Roeblings of Saxonburg at our April meeting. Steele is a veteran actor, director, and playwright of New York and Los Angeles, who later returned home to his ancestral farm in Western Pennsylvania. He has written fifteen historical dramas, five comedies, a musical and a tragedy. A bibliography of his plays can be found on page 3. He also formerly taught in the Armstrong and Freeport School Districts.

In 2019, Steele received the prestigious Arthur St. Clair Award from the Westmoreland Historical Society for his historical dramas depicting life on the Pennsylvania frontier before, during and after the American Revolution.

Together with his wife Marushka, the Steeles founded the Freeport Theatre Festival (FTF) in 1989 as a means to serve local communities with plays chosen to lift spirits and entertain, as well as to provide an outlet for area youth to get involved in a different kind of team effort. President's Letter Building Bridges

Bridges have been very much on my mind these past few days. Of course, I am anticipating the presentation about the Roeblings and the construction of the Brooklyn

Diane Conway also piqued my interest in this topic by suggesting, in her introductory remarks at last week's Branch meeting, that it was actually Emma Warren Roebling who brought the Brooklyn Bridge to completion. She is credited with overseeing one of the most epic engineering feats in history, overcoming immense personal and structural challenges as the Brooklyn Bridge was constructed over a period of fourteen years.

Emma Roebling was an engineer at a time when women were not supposed to be! During bridge construction, when her husband fell ill and could no longer leave their home, Emma stepped in, kept the books, carried messages for her husband, and monitored construction of the bridge. She was the first person to cross the bridge when it opened. Should we have honored Emma during National Women's Month in March, I wondered?

Yet it is not only Emma Roebling who has occupied my thoughts. Our AAUW Branch constructs bridges all the time - not of steel and twisted cables - but those of an intellectual and academic nature. Last month's speaker, Matt Gault, from Fort Ligonier, engaged not only our members, but brought local historians, Bushy Run reenactors, and the historically curious to our meeting. Impersonating the young George Washington, Gault bridged both time and distance to bring Washington to life. I wish that all of our members could have crossed this bridge to the past with us!

Another bridge to our community is the always popular Used Book Sale in support of the Murrvsville Community Library (April 27-29). The Board is hoping for 100% participation from our members. Call Betty Hollingsworth to volunteer. There are jobs for everyone! Please plan to

devote at least an hour or two to working with friends to serve the reading public – and to build a strong bridge between our AAUW Branch and local booklovers. I hope to see everyone at the Book Sale!

The Saxonburg Museum honors the John A. Roebling family displaying pictures and documents describing Roebling's engineering career



and his method of manufacturing twisted wire rope cable, which he patented in 1842. Due to this innovative work, Saxonburg is considered "the birthplace of the wire rope industry in



America.^{*} Adjacent to the Museum is the workshop building where Roebling did his design and engineering work.

Although the Saxonburg Museum does not charge for tours, attendees are encouraged to make a generous donation.

And there are tasks that can be done even if one has some physical limitations.

Some things will stay the same and some things



will change. Once again we will accept books in good shape as well as complete puzzles. The Library requested that certain types of books not be offered

on the UBS tables. So during the culling period: encyclopedias, manuals, textbooks, health and medical books, religious books, comics,

magazines, games, electronics, DVDs and CDs will be boxed up to be taken to HPB. Of course, damaged books and musty and moldy books will be culled and thrown away. The remaining books will be sorted into NON-FICTION, FICTION (with a MYSTERY subcategory), and CHILDREN'S. Adult books will be sold at \$10 a grocery bag (single hardcover books for \$2.00 and single paperback books for \$1.00) and children's books will be sold at \$2.00 a plastic bag (single books for \$0.25). In order to try to get as many books sold as possible before we close the UBS, we will be offering coupons on Thursday, Friday and Saturday morning to everyone who buys a \$10 bag of books so that they can come back on Saturday afternoon for a discount on more bags of books.

We are collecting puzzles to sell. Susan Petrie is the puzzle coordinator. If you have any

questions about puzzle donations, please contact her. Susan will price and organize the puzzles. On Saturday after noon, she will reprice the boxes of puzzles that are left at a discount.



So put it on your calendar. Donate and volunteer thru the month of April. Set up on Wednesday. Work the UBS and buy books and puzzles. Clean up and take away books on Saturday. Let's have a great USED BOOK SALE!
