September Branch Meeting Documenting the Life and Works of a Social Activist

Pauline Greenlick and Charles McCollester

September 12, 2024 10:00 AM

Murrysville Community Library 4130 Sardis Road, Murrysville

Pittsburgh independent filmmaker, Pauline Greenlick, along with renowned labor historian, Charles McCollester, will share their experiences documenting Alice Lynd, Harvard educated ('52) social and human rights activist, who, together with her Harvard-educated husband, the late Staughton Lynd, were involved with the era's most notable social movements, the U. S. civil-rights and anti-war movements. The Lynds, both lawyers, spent much of their lives in Ohio, working to save steel jobs and seeking justice for death row inmates.

Pauline is a graduate of the University of Michigan, and taught in public schools in Ohio, Pennsylvania and Maryland for 40 years. Since her retirement from teaching students with special needs, Pauline Greenlick has produced over 60 films documenting stories in Pittsburgh and Africa. Half of her films focus on the stories of "hidden," marginalized people in Uganda, and the other half document events and stories here in the Pittsburgh area. She serves on the Board of the Battle of Homestead Foundation and the Carnegie Filmmakers. Pauline Greenlick is the Treasurer for the Carnegie Screen Writers and more than 30 of her documentaries have garnered awards.

Charles McCollester, our featured speaker in September 2023 discussing the Pittsburgh Railroad riots and Steel Strikes, was formally educated in the liberal arts, acquiring a PhD in Philosophy from Institute Superieur de Philosophie, Belgium, and educated in practical matters while a civil rights activist, anti-war activist and as a labor worker and Union Steward with Union Switch and Signal in Swissvale, UE Local 610.

Together, Pauline Greenlick and Charles McCollester conducted <u>AAUW-Murrysville Branch</u> three personal interviews with Alice Lynd in 2023 for the documentary of the altruistic lives and social justice works of Staughton and Alice Lynd.

President's Letter The Evolution of the Fight Looking Back to Move Forward

Patricia Byerly, AAUW PA Administrative Director, when asked over a working lunch this summer, what message she had for our local Branch, responded with thematic words from the recent state convention, "Look back, while moving forward", she advised.

Looking back, the AAUW website describes our organization as "tenacious and trailblazing" in advocating for women and girls since 1881. AAUW's first stated goals were to encourage more women to pursue higher education and to advance women's career development. To those ends, the organization has published hundreds of research reports, with subjects as diverse as those of a 1885 study disproving a prevailing myth that college impaired a woman's fertility, to a current study on the economic impact of workplace sexual harassment.

Over the years AAUW has funded a highly esteemed fellowship and grant program, awarding over 70 million dollars to women scholars and various programs for women in the US and overseas. AAUW supported Dr. Marie Curie, the first woman to win the Nobel Prize; Judith Resnik, the second woman to travel in space; and Lilly Ledbetter, equal pay advocate and sponsor of the 2009 Fair Pay Act.

AAUW moves forward with a continued fight to correct structural inequalities in women's education and the workplace based on gender, race, and motherhood. Locally our Branch moves forward this fall in support of our national organization and our local library, while sponsoring an exciting lineup of vastly divergent programs in our speaker's series. September's speakers will focus on the life and works of Alice Lynd by documentary filmmaker Pauline Greenlick. Dr. Philip Nash will speak about Robert Oppenheimer in October. Following a break for the November Used Book Sale, Kelsey Cowles, MLIS, will provide guidance on "Identifying Health Misinformation and Investigating Health Claims" at our December Branch meeting.


