January Branch Meeting Recycling And More: A Novel Community-Based Approach

The Rewind-Reuse Center and Workshop, a 501 (c)(3) organization, was initiated by Val Paulisick on June 7, 2019, in a small shop in downtown Export, PA. The vision was to provide a stimulating space in which to educate, inspire, and empower children and adults. It is dedicated to a green initiative reusing unwanted (but very usable) materials rather than sending items to the landfill. The goal is to educate our community to be better stewards of the environment and to acknowledge the wealth of art and cultural diversity within our world. The Rewind program is able to serve children and adults of all abilities, and help build a life-long audience for art and recycled materials.

Val's interest in learning through arts and crafts stems from growing up in a family of tinkers and hands-on learning. Her broader interest is to be of service to the community at large. The Center itself provides free resources to qualified churches, groups, non-profits and educational programs, and has outreach programs established with other institutions that are mutually beneficial. She has also established a "Free Library" consisting of a free-standing bookcase filled with donated books on a variety subjects, including crafts for children and adults, and literature of all subjects for all ages. The "take one, give one" concept has become very popular within the community.

Val's interest in outreach to the public is reflective of her academic and professional background. She has BS and MSW degrees, and has practiced in the field of Social Work and Health Care for over 23 years. She has also been engaged, for more than 20 years, in non-profit board and State representation in United Cerebral Palsy, Tourette Syndrome and local Board memberships.

Thus, it must seem odd that AAUW this month asks us to think of saving old things, to think of reducing, recycling, reusing, and repurposing our possessions for the health of the planet (and perhaps our own sanity!).

Did you know that . . .

- Recycling has been around for thousands of years.
- 75% of all aluminum produced in the US is still around today.
- Plastic bottles are often recycled into downgraded products, like carpet and fiberfill for jackets.
- Recycling 1 ton of cardboard saves 46 gallons of oil.
- Across the globe, nearly 1 trillion singleuse plastic bags are used every year.
- Over 11 million tons of glass bottles and jars are thrown into landfills each year.
- By recycling 1 ton of paper, 17 trees are saved
- Every day in the US, millions of single-use plastic straws are thrown away.
- There is more plastic in the ocean than there are stars in the Milky Way.

 Electronic waste, or e-waste, represents only 2% of trash in landfill in the US, but equals up to 70% of overall toxic waste.

Five Steps to **Re**duce, **Re**use, **Re**cycle New Year's (**Re**)Solutions



Liesel Clark, on her website, Pioneering the Simple Life" suggests the following "new year's resolutions" for anyone wanting a home decluttered in a sustainable manner. She urges her readership to live more thoughtfully, by buying less and using and reusing what they have.

STEP ONE: Each day of the week choose one room to focus on, so you don't wear yourself out on day one. Do a decluttering pass through the room, carrying a box which will hold the items you're ready to offload.

STEP TWO: Can any of your unwanted stuff be reused? Keeping our <u>stuff</u> in our local materials economy is one of the greatest gifts you can give your own community, connecting you to the people around you and helping us all to reduce our consumption. Don't be shy! Your stuff is another person's treasure.

STEP THREE: Have a few spare boxes ready to hold your leftover unwanted and unused items in your garage, basement, attic or spare room where you can then separate the pile into distinct categories such as:

- Stuff to Donate to an Animal Shelter: Do you have old blankets, towels, or extra pens and pencils hanging about? You'd be surprised to learn what items most animal shelters could use
- 2. Stuff to Donate to a Charity That Will Come and Pick Things Up:
- Electronics Recycling: Take stock of your e-waste — your electronics that no longer

- work or that you haven't used in a year or two, and take them to Best Buy! At most Best Buy stores, you can recycle up to three items per household per day (There are different limitations on TVs, computer monitors and laptops). Plus, haul-away options are available for larger items in your home.
- 4. Metals can go to a nearby scrap metal facility: Metals of all types have value and can be repurposed into new items made of metal. Saving things that are primarily made of metal can benefit your scrap metal facility greatly and keep those precious materials out of the landfill and in our materials economy for years to come.

STEP FOUR: If you're trying to reduce old stockpiled boxes of random stuff, make a pledge to go through one box at a time. Give yourself time to go through it and separate the items into recyclable items and those that can be given away and reused. Try to remind yourself that we're stewards of our stuff on this planet and our job is to, at the end of your stuff's usefulness to you, dispense with it responsibly.

STEP FIVE Make a promise to yourself to be mindful of what you acquire. Promise that all new things going into your home this year will be used and loved extensively, not squirreled away in yet another box to be offloaded at the end of the year, resulting in less waste and less unnecessary clutter in your life for stepping out into a new year.


