

Murrysville AAUW is pleased to have Andrew Conte speak about the changes occurring in the local news. The talk will discuss the many efforts underway across southwestern Pennsylvania to ensure the news has a robust present and future, the role of an independent press in our democracy, and the ways that citizens are taking control of the news more than ever.

Andrew Conte serves as founding director of the Center for Media Innovation at Point Park University in downtown Pittsburgh. Previously, he worked as an investigative journalist, and he has authored several nonfiction books, including *Death of the Daily News* (University of Pittsburgh Press, 2022). In addition to running the Center, Andrew has taught in Point Park University's School of Communication since 2005. Andrew also serves as vice president of the Press Club of Western Pennsylvania.

Andrew holds a Ph.D. in Community Engagement from Point Park University, a master's degree from Columbia University's Graduate School of Journalism and a bachelor's degree from Dickinson College. In his free time, Andrew enjoys long-distance bicycling trips, camping with his wife in their VW bus, international travel, and time with his grown children, who live in New York City.


#### **Cookie Social**

## **Reading for Pleasure**



In March we will be discussing *Horse* by Geraldine Brooks at Debbi Ulusoy's home. Please let Debbi know if you are attending on Thursday, March 27<sup>th</sup>. Call/text or email her. The meeting will start at 10:00 AM. Debbi will be leading the discussion. *Horse* is a historical

novel based on "the true story of the recordbreaking Civil War-era thoroughbred Lexington, the people who cared for him, the artists who painted him, and the scientists who study his bones". The novel spans the eras from the 1850's to the 1950's and on to our times 2020.

At the last RFP meeting we mentioned the possibly adding a meeting to discuss an additional book on the fourth Thursday of April since the Used Book Sale would be later (May 1st, 2nd, and 3rd). Unfortunately, that won't work! During the Puzzle/Cookbook Sale in early February, several of us realized that because the Used Book Sale was happening on the first week in May, there would be a problem with scheduling the AAUW Board Meeting that normally occurs on the first Thursday of the month. The solution to avoid this conflict of events (which affects several of our RFP members, including yours truly) is to have our Board Meeting the week prior to the UBS -Thursday, April 27th. We will have our RFP May Luncheon when we pick our 2025-2026 Reading For Pleasure books to discuss. So start thinking about books you have read and would recommend for everyone to enjoy and discuss next year.

Well, I finished listening to all 41 DiscWorld books by Terry Pratchett by mid-January – it was lovely revisiting this humorous fantasy author but sad to leave DiscWorld and all its memorable characters. Happily one of my long-time favorite authors came out with her 120th plus novel three days later which I immediately bought and devoured. I discovered Jayne Castle's first novel, *Gentle Pirate*, in a used book store in Dayton, Ohio, when my kids were just getting out of diapers. Forty-six years later she is still publishing now under three different pseudonyms and genres and I buy everything

she writes: under Jayne Ann Krentz (contemporary romance/suspense); Amanda Quick (historical romance/suspense); and Jayne Castle (futuristic paranormal romance/ suspense). It's escapism at its finest for me! An Annapolis friend recommended Robert Galbraith (J.K.Rowling's pen name for her private eye series). I read The Cuckoo's Calling and The Silkworm but when I opened Career Of Evil, and the first chapter describes a serial killer that plans to target a main character in the series. I put the book down and am not sure I want to continue with the series - maybe too gory? In between these more serious mysteries, I read a really enjoyable fun book – A Miss Merkel Mystery: Murder At the Castle by David Safier. This is the English translation of the first in a German series that has Angela Merkel as an amateur detective in her retirement. It's laughout-loud outrageous. Somehow Safier gets away with this comedic portrayal of the ex-Chancellor and her husband because there are several more books in the German series but so far only the first has been translated and published in English. I hope the entire series will be soon published in English. I can always use a good laugh.
