

# The Whiskey Rebellion

Brady J. Crytzer Author and Professor of History, Robert Morris University

## April 10, 2025 10:00 AM Murrysville Community Library TechNook 4130 Sardis Road, Murrysville

Brady J. Crytzer, professor of history at Robert Morris University, will lecture and sign copies of his books at the April 10th meeting of Murrysville Area AAUW. As an authority on the frontier history of North America, Crytzer is an Associate Editor of the Journal of the American Revolution and the author of eight books. The professor has been featured on NBC Peacock, C-Span, Fox News, The Washington Post, The Wall Street Journal, Sirius XM, and USA Today. As a commentator in the 2024 TV series," George: Rise of a Revolutionary", Crytzer explored the life of the young George Washington prior to the American Revolution. Crytzer is also the winner of the 2023 Judge Robert K. Woltz History Award.

Professor Crytzer's presentation, "The Whiskey Rebellion: A Distilled History of an American Crisis", will explore the causes of this first great conflict in the new nation. In March 1791 Treasury Secretary Alexander Hamilton shocked the western frontier when he proposed a domestic excise tax on whiskey to balance America's national debt. The law known colloquially as the "Whiskey Act", disproportionately penalized farmers in the backcountry, while offering favorable tax incentives designed to protect larger distillers. Although Hamilton viewed the law as a means of both collecting revenue and forcefully imposing federal authority over the notoriously defiant frontier, settlers in Western Pennsylvania bristled at its passage. They demanded that the law be revoked or rewritten to correct its perceived injustices, and begged their representatives to lobby Congress on their behalf. What resulted was four years of rebellion that grew to become America's first great crisis.

Please plan to attend this enlightening discussion as the author explores the impact of the Whiskey Rebellion on our fledgling nation.



## **Reading for Pleasure**

As mentioned in the March Focus, we will not have an April RFP Meeting because of a conflict with our AAUW Board Meeting. The Used Books Sale will be setting up on April 30<sup>th</sup> and the Sale runs Thursday, May 1<sup>st</sup>, thru Saturday, May 3<sup>rd</sup>. Everyone should plan to pitch in. So we won't meet untilMay and that will be our luncheon meeting when we choose books for the following year 2025-26. Donna Beard will be our hostess and we will meet at her house on the fifth Thursday, May 29<sup>th</sup>.

Ironically as I was finishing reading Horse by Geraldine Brooks and read her "Afterword", I realized that her new book Memorial Davs: A Memoir was available and I bought it. It's a really guick read and an enjoyable one although on the tough subject of the death of a spouse and the grieving process. After Master Slave Husband Wife, I knew I needed something light. I made some good choices and I made some bad choices. I think the titles should have been my clue on the bad choices: I Got Abducted by Aliens and Now I'm Trapped in a Rom-Com by Kimberly Lemming "Lions and Dinosaurs and Sexy Aliens. Oh my!" (My comment when I finished was "too much explicit weird sex; though ' funny") and then Frank Anthony Polito's Renovated To Death: A Domestic Partners in Crime Mystery was a first in series by a local author but my comment after finishing was "very stereotypical, meh". My good choices started with two different series but with both series having similar themes of the protagonist having ghost assistants. I blew through a three book series by Tracy Whitwell (The Accidental Medium, Gin Palace, and Cross Bones) in which I read the second and third books in quick succession and then went back to the first in the series because I knew it was in my stack of books but I couldn't remember the story (ironically I found out I had listed it as read back in April, 2024). My sieve of a brain! Right before The Accidental Medium I listed a book, Alice Bell's Grave Expectations, which I supposedly read back in early 2024 but when I read the second in the series *Displeasure Island* just last month couldn't remember anything about the first

book so I found it and read it"again?". Both series involve "ghosts" but are enjoyable reads. After the *Miss Merkle* fun book (which Janet Sutton pointed out to me that there is a TV series based on the first two books—funny but not as funny as the book, I thought), I switched to another "world leader" series: S.J.Bennett's *The Windsor Knot* and *All the Queen's Men*. Queen Elizabeth II is the sleuth but with assistance from her fictional private secretary. It's a lovely series which is very respectful to the royal family. Fluff is stressrelieving.



As far as listening to audio books, I "escaped" to southern France as I ran my errands while I listened to A Season For That: Lost and Found In the Other Southern France by Steve Hoffman. A Minnesotan Francophile moves his family of four to a tiny village in the non-touristy part of

southern France for a year and learns by his mistakes. It got me thinking about how realistic is it to think about resettling in a foreign country. Then I listened to Mary Beard's *Emperor Of Rome*. I would not recommend listening to this book (because of all the skipping back and forth from BCE to CE and the many emperors names that the author refers to as examples of where they ate and lived, how they traveled and entertained, how they ruled or were reported to have ruled, how they died or were murdered, etc.. The author narrates the book and refers to maps and diagrams and other illustrations so reading the hard copy would be much better.

Well, those have been my reading experiences, but not necessarily my recommendations for discussions. Enjoy the Used Book Sale and then come prepared to share and recommend books for all to read and discuss next year.


