## **Trailblazing Women**of Western Pennsylvania

Western Pennsylvania's history is full of women who broke down barriers and made lasting impacts on both our region and the world. Heinz History Center Volunteer Ambassador Judith Sutton will speak about influential women in Western Pennsylvania who were "firsts" in their field and made significant impacts in their careers.

Among the remarkable women Judith will discuss:

- "Nellie Bly", a pioneer newspaper investigative journalist and intrepid world traveler, known for her 72 day race around the world.
- Bertha Lamme, first female engineer hired by Westinghouse – possibly impressed by her Ohio State thesis titled "An Analysis of Tests of a Westinghouse Railway Generator".
- Helen Richey of McKeesport, the first female pilot of a commercial airline in the United States when she was hired in 1934 by Central Airlines of Greensburg, later part of United Airlines.

Judith Sutton worked as a Children's Librarian for over thirty years. She graduated from Duquesne University with a Bachelor of Arts degree in history and received her Master of Library Science degree from the University of Pittsburgh. Since her retirement, she has become a Docent and an Ambassador for the Heinz History Center and the Historical Society of Mt. Lebanon. She has logged over 1000 volunteer hours for the Heinz History Center and greatly enjoys sharing her love of history.

Please plan to attend this program to learn about and be inspired by many more remarkable women from our region.

#### **President's Letter**

Ms. Neidig then presented plans for Library updates made possible by a \$350,000 competitive grant through the American Rescue Plan. Renovations and planned updates include greater access to broadband access (even in the parking lot), three new "quiet rooms", a new circulation desk, new

carpeting, and an exciting teen center outside of the Director's office.

AAUW is proud to support these exciting plans through the proceeds of our semi-annual book and puzzle sales. Last year we were able to donate \$10,000 to the library! Please mark your calendar and plan to help with the spring sale May  $1^{\text{st}} - 3^{\text{rd}}$ . Come to shop. Bring a friend. 
Puzzles and Special Books are priced individually and are not part of the bag sale price.

From 1982-1984 Diane served as Branch President for an organization of over 300 members! In 1986 the Branch honored her as the Outstanding Woman of the year. In 1988, Diane was in charge of the Branch directory and also edited The Focus, our Branch newsletter. Her leadership in AAUW Book Sales is legendary, experience which has been passed on to Book Sale chairs through the decades, and continues to this day. We thank her for her generous sharing of her time and talents to make each Used Book Sale a success!

Graduating from the University of Massachusetts Amherst, with both a BS and MS in the Sciences, she later received the MLS in Library Science degree from the University of Pittsburgh. She worked for many years in the Westinghouse Research Library. Diane and her husband have two sons, who also have pursued careers in the sciences.

Our members enjoy Diane's lively participation in Reading for Pleasure, noting that she is a deep thinker, opinionated "in a good way", always direct, thoughtful and kind.

### **Reading for Pleasure**

Reading for Pleasure will meet this month at the home of Donna Beard on Thursday, May 29<sup>th</sup> (note this is the fifth Thursday of the month) at 10:00 AM. It is our luncheon meeting in which we choose our reading choices for the 2025 – 2026 AAUW year. Carol Gezon will canvas all of us in order to winnow the reading list down for our voting. Closer to the meeting we will figure out who can bring what to share for our luncheon. Please let Carol know if you have any more books to recommend. Remember that even if we don't choose a book for discussion, we still list summer reading recommendations in the June Focus.

March and April must have been busier months than I expected because as I look over my "Books Read" list on my smart phone I see I only read three books and listened to three audio books. My three books were all mysteries. A Grim Reaper's Guide to Catching a Killer: A S.C.Y.T.H.E. Mystery by Maxie Dara seems to follow the trend of a ghost helping the protagonist. This is the first in a series, I believe, because of the ending leaving a reason for continuation. Deanna Raybourn's Killswell with Others is the second in a series which started with Killers of a Certain Age. The premise is four professional female assassins who after forty years retire but have to return to their profession to take care of old business: "older women often feel invisible, but sometimes that's their secret weapon". Both books are fun reads. And then my third book was the third in the S.J. Bennett's series which has Queen Elizabeth II as the investigator thru proxy. I enjoyed Murder Most Royal: Her Majesty the Queen *Investigates*. The descriptions of Christmas at Sandringham were part of the charm of the book.

The three listening experiences were quite different. I listened to *James* by Percival Everett, which I really recommend as a listening experience as one of the themes of

the story is how James speaks in different speech patterns depending upon who hears him. I then had the pleasure of hearing the author's lecture at the Pittsburgh Arts and Lectures Ten Evenings series. The next audio book I listened to was the nonfiction audio book by the Countess of Carnaryon: The Earl and the Pharaoh. The author narrated this story of George "Porchy" Herbert, 5th, Earl of Carnarvon: his life, his financial backing of Howard Carter's Egyptian excavations, the discovery of Tutankhamun's tomb, and his death. The third audio book was the seventh of a series by Mick Herron: Slough House which continues the saga of Slow Horses. Slough House is the decrepit office where "the washed-up MI 5 spies go to while away what's left of their failed careers". My sister recommended the TV series, Slow Horses, which stars Gary Oldman and Kristen Scott Thomas. I watched the first year's six episodes and got hooked on the characters. I didn't realize that I had jumped from the first book Slow Horses which introduces this ensemble of failed spies to the seventh in the series. I feel I now need to fill in the intervening books.

I hope you have had some enjoyable reading experiences and that you will share them with us. Plan to join us at Donna Beard's home on May 29th at 10:00. Carol and I will be communicating more information on this luncheon later in the month. Let's all support the Used Book Sale on May 1st, 2nd, and 3rd and help with set-up on April 30th and takedown on May 3rd, Saturday afternoon. See you in May.
