

"Greetings from the Lincoln Highway" takes a fun look back at America's first cross-county road, before paved streets or even gas stations. In Pennsylvania, much of Route 30 now follows the old highway and still offers travelers some fun and wacky experiences. Construction of the Lincoln Highway between 1913 and 1928 spurred westward expansion and economic growth. In Pennsylvania, Route 30 covers about 324 miles and continues to be a vital, well used east-west corridor in our area.

Brian Butko has been researching and writing books on popular history since the 1980s, and has been named Pittsburgh City Paper "Best Local Writer" three times! You can watch his interview with Rick Sebak in the video, "A Ride Along the Lincoln Highway" in 2009. In addition to writing several books on the Lincoln Highway, his other book topics include Isaly's Dairy, the Ship Hotel, Kennywood Park, diners and roadside attractions. #### **Used Puzzle and LEGO Sale**

The summer Used Puzzle and LEGO Sale on August 4 and 5 at the Murrysville Library was a success! We had about 50 interested shoppers lined up before the library opened.

Under Susan Petrie's wise leadership, the Puzzle Team stored unsold puzzles from our Spring Used Book & Puzzle Sale and then prepared additional recently donated puzzles for the summer sale. At the start of the 2-day sale, eager shoppers were offered a pleasing selection of 364 puzzles. By the end of the second day, there were just 23 puzzles left on the sales tables. The puzzles brought in over \$800!

With great help from Lisa Roudabush and my grandchildren, shoppers were offered a varied selection of over 100 used LEGO kits that were reasonably priced and an opportunity to scoop from bins of sorted LEGO bricks, pieces and figures for a bag sale. On August 4, the sale began at 9:30am and by 10:00am, all the kits were sold. By 1:00pm, nearly all of the bins were empty. We announced on various social media sites that due to the great support of our sale, the LEGO section was sold out! The LEGO sales brought in over \$1900 for a grand total of \$2761.25 for the 2-day sale.

To the generous people who donated items for sale, to those who spread the word about the sale, to the dedicated shoppers who frequently "rounded up" at the Cashier Table, to the library staff who promoted the sale and prepared the sale areas, and to all of you who helped before and at the sale — I send my biggest THANK YOU for your support of this sale to benefit the Murrysville Library.





# **Reading for Pleasure**



I hope everyone had a good summer and found plenty of books to read and enjoy. I want to point out that last June's "Reading for Pleasure 2025-2026 Selections" are listed in this Focus as well. First on the list is our September choice: *James* by Percival Everett. We will meet on the

fourth Thursday of the month, September 25th, at the home of Susan Petrie and I will be leading the discussion. The meeting will begin at 10:00. Please let Susan know if you plan to be at her home

Let me give you all a heads-up that because of the renovations at the Murrysville Community Library, we will be meeting at members' homes all this year. Because of our choices of books to discuss this year, there also may be a shortage of available library books to check out and you may want to look into the Carnegie Library resources as well as the Westmoreland Library Network.

My summer was rather hectic so I feel I was listening mostly to "cotton candy for the mind" books interspersed with escapist mysteries. Most were enjoyable nevertheless. Back in May and early June, I did finish all the Mick Herron *Slow Horses* series that are so far on audio. The TV series has not quite caught up but I enjoyed watching what has been done so far— Gary Oldman and Kristen Scott Thomas are really great portraying two of the main characters.

After reading an article in *USA Today* about the travails of the actor, Alexander Skarsgard, prepping for his lead role in AppleTV's new series *Murderbot*, I decided I needed to read the science fiction books by Martha Wells that the television series are based on. I listened to them as audiobooks and chuckled as I listened. The series describes itself as follows: "Security android struggles with emotions and free will while balancing dangerous missions and its desire for isolation; evading detection of its self-hacking as it finds its place." The narrator, Kevin R. Free, is wonderful vocalizing his disgust with the "stupidity" of humans. I then

watched the first few episodes on AppleTV and enjoyed Skarsgard's portrayal. I can't wait to watch the end of this year's dramatizations. Another series that I have listened to this summer in which the voice of the narrator has added to the pleasure of the book is The Amelia Peabody Novels of Suspense. Many years ago I read quite a few of Elizabeth Peters' Amelia Peabody's Egyptology mysteries. At our Used Book Sale I recommended one to Lisa Roudabush. Remembering my pleasure reading the series. I decided to do as I had done with Terry Pratchett's DiscWorld books and returned to the series again but this time listening to the audio versions. And I must say I am so glad that I did! Barbara Rosenblat, the narrator of the Peters' series, is wonderful. She personifies the Victorian superciliousness of Amelia Peabody to a T! Fun! While visiting northern Michigan I went to a village fair where an author was hawking his books in one of the tents. Michael Carrier was guite a character himself as he peddled his books to me. Murder on Sugar Island was his second in his Jack Handler series and he recommended that I start with that as it was set in Michigan and that if I liked it to come back for more of the series. He told me a wild story about the first in the series so I have ordered that one but so far it is on one of my stacks to be read. Just by the titles you can tell my other readings were definitely summer reading fare: Murder Takes a Vacation by Laura Lippman; Beach Reads and Deadly Deeds by Allison Brennan; The Retirement Plan by Sue Hincenberg: The World's Greatest Detective and Her Just Okay Assistant by Liza Tully; A Proposal to Die For by Molly Harper; A Case of Mice and Murder: The Trials of Gabriel Ward by Sally Smith; and one of my favorite author's latest paranormal romance mysteries It Takes a Psychic by Jayne Castle (aka Jayne Ann Krentz). This is the 17th in the Ghost Hunter series and as always features a mischievous "dustbunny". Thus I escaped my cares thru some rather demanding times. I hope you found pleasure in your reading as well.
