October Branch Meeting Al and Disinformation



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It is with great pleasure that we welcome Dr. Kathleen Carley as our speaker at the October 9th AAUW Branch Meeting. Dr. Carley will be presenting "AI and Disinformation". Recent advances in artificial intelligence have made it easier to create and spread disinformation, and in some cases to counter it. This presentation discusses the nature of AI, and disinformation. In doing so, key AI enabled technologies such as bots and cyborgs are introduced and their role in the information environment described. Results demonstrate how AI is being used to influence individuals, increase and decrease the impact of opinion leaders, and create groups.

Dr. Carley has SB degrees in both economics and political science from M.I.T., a Ph.D. degree in sociology from Harvard University, and an HD from the University of Zurich. She is a professor in the Software and Societal Systems Department in Carnegie Mellon's School of Computer Science. Her research combines cognitive science, sociology, organization science, and computer science to address complex social and organizational issues such as disinformation, counterterrorism, and organizational design.

The presentation is open to the public and all are welcome to attend. There is no registration required.





President's Letter What is Artificial Intelligence?



'To explain AI to beginners, define Artificial Intelligence as computer systems that mimic human intelligence, enabling them to learn from data, solve problems, and

make decisions without being explicitly programmed for every scenario. Use analogies, such as teaching a child to identify animals by showing them pictures, to illustrate Al's ability to learn from examples. Highlight its practical applications, from everyday tools like spam filters and voice assistants, and emphasize that Al learns and improves with experience and data.'

This is the advice that my trusty "Co-Pilot" artificial intelligence assistant gave when I asked the program how to introduce AI to "beginners". We know that AI mimics human intelligence, learns from accumulated data, makes decisions, finds patterns, and gets better with practice. It is used in health care to analyze medical images, in finance to identity unusual financial activity and to detect fraud, and in spam filters to evaluate email messages. Siri and Alexa, virtual assistants, use AI to understand our requests and tailor content to our preferences. AI is already an important player in our everyday lives.

With AI becoming more pervasive with each passing day, we are delighted to welcome Dr. Kathleen Carly from Carnegie Melon University as she delivers an update on artificial intelligence at our October 9th Branch meeting. Reading for Pleasure

Locations were switched around in September and October for our RFP meetings, so please note that October's Reading For Pleasure meeting will be held at Carol Gezon's home on



Thursday, October 23, at 10:00 AM. The book we will be discussing is *Becoming Madam Secretary* by Stephanie Dray. Janet Sutton will be our discussion leader. There are eleven books available thru the Library system.

Because of some chaos in my life, I couldn't seem to sit down and read many books. I did listen to guite a few fluff stories (humorous regencies/romances/mysteries by Beverley Watts chronicling the adventures of Reverend Augustus Shackleford's attempts to marry off his eight daughters and his one son) as I drove around preparing for trips, etc. I did get to read the following books: The Cat Who Caught a Killer by L.T. Shearer, The Unexpected Inheritance of Inspector Chopra by Vaseem Khan (skimmed towards end because of too much location details and too much on my mind), and Too Old for This by Samantha Downing (enjoyable even though told in the voice of a serial killer - a seventy plus year old female serial killer!). I had earlier read a historical mystery (The Case of Mice and Men by Sally Smith) based in the legal world of the Inner Temple and had hoped to finish the second book in the series before I left for England with my sisters. Unfortunately I lost my copy of The Case of Mice and Limb (sequel to The Case of Mice and Men) somewhere and had to reorder the book (it arrived after I flew to London). I did listen to Adventures of Huckleberry Finn by Mark Twain in preparation to discussing James. And I again listened in its entirety to James by Percival Everett on the long flight home to Pittsburgh.

"Small world" incident: traveling on a double-decker bus from Selfridge to Harrods, we passed a bus advertising the *Slow Horses* TV series with Gary Oldman as Jackson Lamb. My

sisters and I started talking about how excited we were to see the ad for the next year's episodes as I had listened to the Mick Herron books and then watched all the shows. The man seated in front of me turned and asked how we recognized the show. It turned out he was the hand double for the Jackson Lamb character that is featured at the end of each episode. He showed me four different photos on his smart phone giving his credentials and shots of his hand on the desk at the show's ending. In the small town of Deal on the English Channel, my sisters and I started a friendly exchanging with three people (two women and a man) at the next table in The Frog and Scot. When they were leaving one of the women leaned over and said that Baz, the man, was a famous columnist. I looked him up (Baz Bamigboye) and he writes a column called "Breaking Baz" for the online Deadline Hollywood now. Previously he worked as the entertainment columnist for the U.K. Daily Mail and other London and New York City newspapers and had won several awards. Small World!!!
